The Shively Fire Department participates in a free smoke detector program for residents in the City of Shively. Our detector is a 10 year lithium ionization sensor smoke alarm.

Requirements and qualifications to receive a free smoke alarm are the following below:

1. Must be a resident of the City of Shively
2. Must be a place of residence and not a business
3. Must own the home and not a renter of the property
4. Must be installed by Shively Fire Department personnel
5. One detector per household per year

I would like to thank all the citizens of Shively. The works department likes to treat the citizens of Shively like customers. Even though we do not always get it right we continue to address customer issues.

It is springtime in Shively the grass is growing, and the trees are in bloom. We are busy picking up yard waste ever Tuesday.

Just a reminder about yard waste collection: Only yard waste no trash-----yard waste must be in paper or ecofriendly plastic bags (no regular plastic bags) -----Limbs must be smaller than 6 inches in diameter-----Limbs and branches should be cut to less than 4 feet then bundle, and tied-----yard waste containers should not weigh more than 50 pounds---- branches cannot extend more than one foot over the top of the can.

Recycling continues to be popular for our residents. Boxes need to be broken down and cut up to fit in the recycling container. To aid in the disposal of recycling all recycle must be in the container. If possible, use plastic bags to dispose of recycle in the container. This helps the operators empty the container and reduces waste blowing out of the trucks.

Spring is also a popular time to do some spring cleaning. We pick up large items once a month for the residents of Shively. If your trash day is on Wednesdays, your large item pick up will be the second Friday of every month. If your trash day is on Thursdays, your large item pick up will be the third Friday of every month. Large items should be out by 6:30 am on your schedule pick up day. It is okay to place items out the day before.

Now that winter is over the works department can get back to work on drainage around the city. The works department is currently working on installing 460 feet of pipe to help with drainage in the Peleske and Burrell area. We continue to work on residential drainage.

Work has already begun on a new area for our residents. This area will be named "Wade-Braden Peace Park" the park will be located near the intersection of Burrell Dr and Crums Lane. The Works department Director will work with the Shively City Mayor and Council to move this project forward.

The works department has many responsibilities. Work department employees may be cutting grass, working on drainage or picking up trash. This is just a few examples of the work that needs to be done around the City of Shively. We receive many positive complements, but like I said earlier we do not always get it right. Some projects take more time and resources than others. We at the works department continue to strive to make things better for the City of Shively.

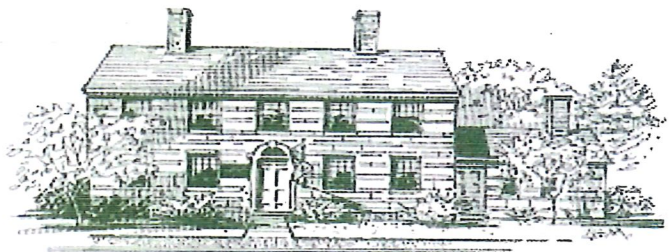

Inspired by Anne Braden's 1958 memoir, "The Wall Between," this film combines multiple forms of puppetry to tell the story of two families who challenged Louisville's segregated housing market. From her living room in 2002, an elderly Anne Braden tells the 1954 story of when she

and her husband Carl (both of whom were white) purchased a house in an all-white Shively neighborhood on behalf of their friends Andrew and Charlotte Wade (who were Black). The Wades and Bradens endured a backlash of white supremacist hatred in the midst of anti-communist hysteria, and none of their lives would ever be the same again. Content warning: contains images and stories of racially-motivated violence, including references to lynching. Recommended for ages 9+. The film is 45 minutes long.

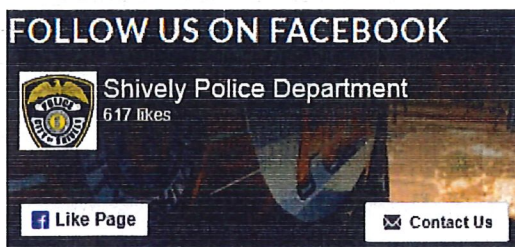

SAM is closed the first Monday of every month.

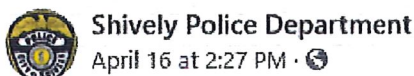

During the past year, the police department took 137 reports for vehicle thefts. This is something that you as citizens can help avoid by using a couple simple steps to possibly keep a thief from stealing your vehicle.

Tips/Information to Help Keep Our Neighborhoods Safe!



1. Immediately report any suspicious person, or vehicle to (502) 448-6181 or (502) 930-2773. This is not just for vehicle vandalism but drug activity, home/garage vandalism - ANY suspicious activity! Make a report!
2. Never leave anything of value in your vehicle; this includes laptops, purses, GPS devices and even loose change.
3. Always lock your vehicle doors.

4. Remove garage door openers from vehicles usually parked outside.
5. Do not leave your keys in your vehicle. Do not warm up your vehicles without you in them!
6. Do not leave the windows of you vehicle open, or partially open.
7. Try to park your vehicle in a well-lit area.
Never leave a firearm unprotected in your vehicle

Late last month, just minutes before a constitutionally required midnight deadline, the General Assembly wrapped up the longest “short” session I have ever been a part of. It earned that distinction because of the ongoing impact of the pandemic, historic winter weather, and a blistering pace that saw the House and Senate enact a little more than 200 new laws in 30 working days.

On the positive side, bipartisanship made a profound difference in several significant ways. First, legislators on both sides of the aisle and Governor Andy Beshear came together to support a billion-dollar plan to use about half of Kentucky’s federal stimulus money to greatly expand access to broadband internet and clean drinking water and to help businesses facing higher unemployment insurance costs.

Second, we made it easier to vote by permanently adding three extra days to cast a ballot before an election and to let counties set up voting centers that could be used by anyone registered in the county. At a time when many Republican-led states are making it tougher to vote, Kentucky received welcomed national publicity by making it easier.

A third example of bipartisanship will particularly benefit our community by providing greater legal certainty for the slot-like historical horse racing machines, which were at risk of being permanently shut down due to a Kentucky Supreme Court ruling last year. While this law is very much needed, there is also broad agreement that the state should receive a larger share of the proceeds from this multi-billion dollar business, an issue that will hopefully be addressed in 2022.

While those new laws were a bright silver lining, there were quite a few dark clouds as well. Perhaps most prominent among those was an attempt to limit the governor’s state-of-emergency powers, an issue that thankfully is now in the hands of the courts.

There were other power grabs to limit the governor’s authority, and the legislature also regrettably approved a two-pronged attack on public education. One new law will use \$25 million in tax dollars to pay for private schooling in Kentucky’s largest counties and for other school expenses like uniforms and tutoring. The other law will reduce guaranteed retirement benefits for teachers hired in 2022 and beyond, a move that will make it even tougher to fill critical teacher shortages. On top of everything else, the legislature also approved a one-year state budget that is sadly far stingier than the one Governor Beshear proposed in January.

The legislature’s time to pass new laws may be over for the year, but House and Senate committees will begin meeting monthly in June to prepare for 2022’s legislative session, which will last for 60 days.

In ending, I want to say how proud I am to serve as this community’s state representative and to serve the commonwealth as House Minority Floor Leader. If you have any questions or comments about state policy, or need assistance accessing a state-run program, please let me know. I will be glad to do all I can to help.



Evolve502 Scholarship Allows Class of 2021 to Attend College Tuition FREE

JCPS seniors can go to college for free through a new scholarship offered by Evolve502.

The scholarship, which launched Oct. 1, allows eligible students in the Class of 2021 to begin postsecondary studies tuition-free at any Kentucky Community and Technical College school, including Jefferson Community and Technical College, or Simmons College of Kentucky to pursue an associate degree or career credential, take 60 hours of credit. The Evolve502 scholarship is a last dollar scholarship, meaning Evolve502 will fund the difference between federal and state financial aid and college tuition.

The application takes about five minutes to complete online at evolve502.org/scholarship. Once applications are submitted and reviewed, applicants will receive a follow-up email with next steps including completing the federal financial aid form and applying to eligible colleges.

In addition to the scholarship, Evolve502 is offering opportunity grants to support students whose families earn less than \$40,000 annually. The opportunity grants are \$1,000 per semester (\$2,000 maximum per year) and can be used to assist in costs outside of tuition including healthcare, transportation, books and more. The grants will automatically be given to Evolve502 Scholarship recipients who meet qualifications.

The deadline to apply is June 30.

CODE ENFORCEMENT TOP CODE VIOLATIONS

TRASH - All trash and garbage left outside one's residence awaiting pickup must be stored in containers with lids at all times. Bagged trash and/or cardboard boxes may not be left sitting next to the approved blue trash bins, it will not be picked up.

MISCELLANEOUS PROPERTY MAINTENANCE VIOLATIONS - Includes a variety of code sections regarding the maintenance of the exterior structures (e.g. broken windows, falling down sheds, tarps on roofs, trees growing out of gutters, gutters falling off, roofing)

UNREGISTERED/INOPERABLE MOTOR VEHICLES - Unless stored in a fully enclosed structure, all motor vehicles are to be properly registered and operable at all times. Placing a tarp or cover over the vehicle does not cure the violation.

DEBRIS - Junk, debris, furniture, tree branches/stumps, and other items are prohibited from being stored on the exterior of all residential properties.

HIGH WEEDS & GRASS - Grass and weeds are always to be maintained at a height of 8 inches or less.

PARKING ON GRASS - Vehicles may not be parked on the grass or dirt of properties. All vehicles, trailers, boats, etc. are to be parked or stored on a hardened surface.

VACANT, UNSECURED HOMES - Any vacant home or business must be maintained as if it were being occupied (e.g. grass cut, shrubs trimmed, exterior of structure in good repair, and any doors and windows secured to prevent unauthorized entry into the dwelling).

BUILDING WITH OUT PERMITS - Building permits are required for most types of construction and many types of home improvement projects (e.g. plumbing, heating, decks, some sheds, garages, additions, adding an additional driveway etc.). Contact Planning & Design, (502) 574-6230, 444 S. 5th Street, 8am – 5pm.

USE OF GRAVEL - From and after July 1, 2009, parking pads, driveway construction or driveway extensions shall be constructed of either concrete or asphalt.

YARD REPAIR - Any property that has damage from parking in yard/ditch line or driving through the yard/ditch line will be responsible for repairing damage left in the yard.

LEAVES - All property owners are responsible for raking leaves on your property, even if you do not have a tree in your yard. Leaves commonly block storms drains, gutters, and the pipes under driveways causing water problems all over the city.

LOUD MUSIC – Residents are asked to refrain from loud music out of respect for neighbors.

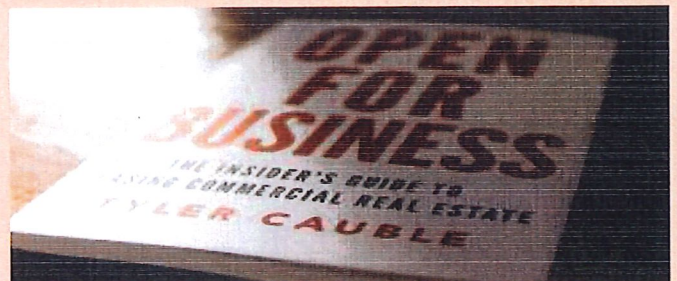
